Marquette Branch *Martha Griffiths Award*Given to NMU Senior

The 2016 Marquette Branch Martha Griffiths award is given to Grace Orstad, a Biochemistry major graduating from Northern Michigan University May 2016. She will receive a certificate and check for \$250.

Ms. Orstad has served as the Organizational Chair of the Students for the Upper Michigan Brain Tumor Center and Executive Chair of the Wordy Wizards. Ms. Orstad has contributed 100 hours of community service as a member of the NMU Student Leadership Fellowship Program, completed all four edges of the Superior Edge program, a service trip to Thailand, served as a bereavement counselor for children at U.P. Camp Star, and has received the Heart and Soul Award for community service. All this while earning a 3.96 GPA and working as a pharmacy technician and chemistry stockroom assistant. Ms. Orstad has also presented research at two different science conferences receiving poster prizes at both. Her future plans are to start graduate school in the fall in biomedical science. Ms. Orstad comes to Northern Michigan University from Burnsville, Minnesota.

IT'S ALL ABOUT EQUITY

The U.S. Women's National. Soccer Team filed a discrimination complaint with the Equal Employment Opportunities Commission (EEOC).

The U.S. Soccer Federation pays male players \$5,000 for a loss in a friendly exhibition match and up to \$17,625 for a win. Female players get \$ 1,350 per match if the team wins. Female players are given a base salary of \$72,000 a year per player. Men are not given a base salary. The pay per player for each exhibition game, for women averages \$3,600 and men get \$5000 per game. If women lose all their games they get their base salary 72,000. If they win all with their games with their bonuses they get \$99,000. Men's yearly pay is \$100,000 if they lost all games and \$363,320 if they won all. The women receive smaller per diem pay than men. In 2015 the women's team earned 2 million for winning the World Cup while the men made 9 million without advancing beyond round 16. World Cup bonuses per player are \$20,000 for third place for women, \$52,063 for men. For second place \$32,500 for

women, \$260,417 for men. And for first place \$75,000 for women and \$390,625 for men. The 2015 Women's World Cup Women's Soccer final was the most watched soccer match in the history of televised soccer events. Let's hope women can negotiate a more equitable deal.

AAUW released "Barriers and Bias: The Status of Women in Leadership."

It isn't a pretty story. Female CEO's head only 5% of the companies in the S and P 500. Only 1 in 5 members of Congress are women. In K-12 education where women dominate the field, only 20% of the superintendents are women. Only 25% of those whose annual income is \$100,000 or more are women. Looking at this research in depth and asking why so few seems worth our delving into for next year's program.

Lastly consider going to the Michigan AAUW convention in Troy, Michigan on April 30.
