Our Branch raises money to help advance "equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research." We raise money for the STEM Program for 5th and 6th grade girls in Alger and Marquette counties. We did this Program on Friday, May 20, at the Seaborg Center. The money we raise for the STEM Program is in a special account and cannot be used for other donations. We sponsor a Scholarship for a woman enrolled at Northern Michigan University. Most of this money comes from our Book Sale (\$2900), but it is not enough to cover the scholarship. We donate to groups for young women and girls such as Girl Scouts, Girls Robotics, etc. We would like to do \$tart Smart again. We did it this in 2015 at NMU but this program costs money to National AAUW and to pay the facilitator. This program teaches students how to negotiate salaries at their jobs. This is focused on women.

We need to find new source(s) of income. We have a small surplus left in our savings. Now we are donating only \$500 to the AAUW National Scholarships. We used to donate \$1500. We are raising some money with receipts from Econo and some from Younker's. If we don't have another source of gaining money, we may not have much money for the Scholarship and other donations.

REPRODUCTIVE FREEDOM and the Supreme Court

The U.S. Supreme Court sent a critical case dealing with women's access to birth control back to the lower courts to work out a solution to the Affordable Care Act's mandated coverage of birth control. In Zubik v. Burwell, religious non- profits argued they should not be required to provide birth control to employees as part of their health coverage. AAUW joined allies at the steps of the Supreme Court calling for support of reproductive rights.

Three states passed anti reproductive bills. Oklahoma made it a felony for doctors to perform abortions. South Carolina legislators outlawed abortion after 19 weeks and Louisiana requires a woman to wait 72 hours after their meeting with a physician and the procedure taking place.

Merrick Garland, President Obama's Supreme Court nominee met with 15 Republican Senators, but no more are scheduled. Former Justice John Paul Stevens called the delay in the Senate' s consideration of Garland "unfortunate" and said he does not believe the Court functions efficiently with eight justices. Legislation has been introduced to keep Congress in session through the summer and the year unless Merrick Garland's nomination is considered by July 19. Ending on cheerier notes. Maryland passed Equal Pay legislation which closes loopholes in existing state equal pay laws and protects workers from retaliation if they discuss their salaries.

Exciting news. Our Branch will host a community conversation following our Salad Supper, September 8, 2016 at Peter White Public Library. We are joining forces with The Center for Michigan, a nonprofit, non-partisan think- and do-tank. This public discussion will focus on what it would take to return trust in public services delivered by state government. What would help restore trust in Michigan's elected officials and the political process? What are your ideas for improving both state government services and Michigan politics? Our voice matters.
