The Marquette Chapter of the AAUW gives this award annually to a high-achieving graduating female senior at NMU. The award is named in honor of one of Michigan's most influential women legislators in the last half of the 20th century. Martha Griffiths was known for her efforts in the Civil Rights Act and for bringing the Equal Rights Amendment to the House floor for a vote in 1970. Mattie's breakthrough in the field of cybersecurity will help future generations of women achieve successful careers in this highly relevant and challenging field. Mattie is an Information Systems major. She has served as an Information Technology Intern for the Marquette Area Public School District, where she helped faculty, teachers, and students solve technology problems. She will begin her career in Detroit for Ford Motor Company this summer in cybersecurity, a field traditionally populated by men. Her three-year rotational job includes mobile security, penetration testing of computer systems, and vehicle security. While a fulltime student, Mattie worked at the YMCA of Marguette County where she has operated the YMCA front desk, volunteered for Love Your Y events, and chaperoned middle school dances. She donates a portion of her checks to the Annual YMCA Campaign to help community members in need receive discounted rates toward YMCA memberships and programs. We congratulate Mattie for the Martha Griffiths Award, which includes a certificate, recognition dinner, and \$250 in cash. Congratulations, Mattie!

Rabah Gabasha

moved to Marquette two years ago as a transfer student to NMU during the Winter Semester 2016. She will graduate this May from Northern with highest honors (summa cum laude with a 4.0 GPA) and a major in International Studies with a concentration in the Middle East.
