AAUW opposes Brett Kavanaugh's confirmation

AAUW Action Fund Capitol Hill Lobby Corps members visited 96 offices to urge senators to oppose Judge Kavanaugh's confirmation. AAUW members across the U.S. called senate offices. It is still vital that senators hear from you. Call Senator Debbie Stabenow at 906 228 8756 and Senator Gary Peters at 906 226 4554 Urge them to continue to do everything possible to stop Judge Kavanaugh's confirmation. If you have friends and relatives in other states urge them to call their Senators to stop Judge Brett Kavanaugh's confirmation.

Dr. Christine Blasey Ford showed such courage in her testimony accusing Judge Kavanaugh. Senator Jeff Flake (R AZ) pushed for an FBI investigation despite his vote to approve Kavanaugh's confirmation in committee.

Put the sexual misconduct allegations aside for the moment. AAAUW carefully reviewed Judge Kavanaugh's available record. Including his record on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit., his known speeches and writings. His full record has not been disclosed. Judge Kavanaugh has consistently failed to ensure protection for workers who have faced discrimination. He has dismissed claims that a majority of D.C. Circuit colleagues found to be of merit. In his dissenting opinion in Howard v Office of Chief Administrative office of the U.S. House of Representatives his argument would have limited workers in Congressional offices and throughout the legislative branch from pursuing claims in federal court including sexual harassment, discrimination and retaliation claims.

Judge Kavanaugh has shown he would be willing to severely weaken or overturn women's right to access abortion. He ruled to delay an abortion of a 17-year old undocumented young women in government custody. Four days later the full D.C. circuit reheard the case and ruled the young woman was entitled to exercise her right to choose without delay. Hi dissent demonstrated his lack of support for this constitutional right.

Judge Kavanaugh supported South Carolina's restrictive and discriminatory government photo ID law which the Department of Justice objected to because the laws harmed voters of color. His opinion shows a willingness to roll back the Voting Rights Act which has protected voters of color for decades.

According to AAUW 's analysis, Judge Kavanaugh will not stand up for health, education and economic security for women and girls. AAUW's analysis concluded his confirmation devalues the promise of justice for all.

In other public polity news...

The Department of Education is withholding federal grant money from the Chicago Public Schools because the district has failed to adequately protect students a from sexual violence. This failure is a violation of Title IX.
