Three regional AAUW branches of the Upper Peninsula (Escanaba, Iron Mountain-Kingsford, and Marquette) met at

the Women's Federated

Clubhouse on Sat 13-Oct-2018.

AAUW Michigan President Deb Kennedy was a guest of honor. Deb's message to the 36 attendees was to diversify and grow AAUW branches. She invoked her lens as a member on the 2018-2020 AAUW National Membership Committee and as AAUW President of our state to encourage growth and involvement in AAUW branches.

Currently, Michigan has 33 AAUW branches, which provide 2,404 members to the AAUW-Michigan. Michigan is also home to 1,603 National members who do not have an AAUW branch affiliation. As President of AAUW-Michigan, Deb wants to support branch and membership growth through more frequent and updated communication and more access to AAUW-Michigan board members.

Our Sat 13-Oct-2018 tri-branch event represented the first regional branch gathering in Deb's tenure. The event featured a half-day workshop to share ideas on fundraising, mission-based programming, membership growth and retention. A second goal of the event was to establish a working relationship with AAUW-Michigan state board members, President Deb Kennedy and Secretary Janice Van Gasse. AAUW has a long and distinguished history of advancing educational and professional opportunities for women in the United States and around the globe. AAUW

is one of the world's largest sources of funding for graduate women. This 2018–19 academic year, \$3.9 million in AAUW funding was provided for fellowships and grants to 250 outstanding women and nonprofit organizations. The longstanding, generous contributions of AAUW members allow a broader community of women to gain access to needed educational and economic opportunities.

Our AAUW Marquette Branch contributes \$500.00 annually to the AAUW National Educational Foundation in the name of outstanding members of our Branch. At our October meeting, we celebrated Mary Snitgen as the 2018 Named Grant Honoree. Mary was lauded for her actions to implement AAUW National priorities and for her commitment and service to our AAUW Marquette Branch as Membership Co-Chair for multiple terms and longstanding member of the Program Committee. According to her good friend and former Membership Committee Co-Chair, Les Bek, "Mary is a wonder at membership recruitment, always ready to let her friends know how wonderful our AAUW Branch is."

As an AAUW Marquette Board member, Mary led our Branch to improve the integration of new members into branch activities. She suggested each board member "adopt" a new graduate and offer to accompany them at AAUW meetings. She also urged Board members to describe their duties for all Executive Board positions to help with transitions and orientations of new Board members to their responsibilities.

Mary led efforts to promote AAUW National priorities locally and at other branches, including StartSmart training, the STEM program, and ElectHer. She created an AAUW informational poster and a presentation board to increase our AAUW message and presence in the greater community. Mary wrote articles for the NMU North Wind newspaper to highlight the strong connection between our Branch and NMU. She was an instrumental advocate for creating our AAUW Marquette website. With a hallmark of high conscientiousness, Mary has monitored various tasks

for outreach activities and pushed these activities toward success, even while traveling.

Mary's professional career began in the field of nursing and health education, where she holds both Bachelor and Master's degrees. As a nurse, Mary exhibited her caring, compassionate spirit and honed her "I can do something about that" vision. She was recognized nationally and statewide for her pioneering work in the field of diabetes outreach and education. Her research and program leadership continue to serve as a model of best practice. Mary's initiatives have led to an improved quality of life for persons with diabetes and have saved millions of dollars in health care costs through prevention and proper care management.

Mary's talents and contributions to our community also extend to her membership in the Marquette Choral Society. She embraces our clean, healthy, and *sustainable* environment while hiking the U.P. trails. Mary is mother to three, grandmother to five, spouse to Don, and colleague to us. Remembering Lydia Hoff AAUW found her always in the vanguard of dynamic, professional university women



Lydia Henriette Hoff (nee Wael), of Marquette, Michigan passed quietly in her sleep on the morning of October 20, 2018 after a short illness. She was surrounded by her family and loved ones.

Born in Brussels Belgium in 1920, Lydia was a member of the Allied Expeditionary Force during WWII. She was part of the first Red Cross team

to enter the concentration camp at Dachau to liberate and to care for the holocaust survivors.

Lydia came to the United States on a Fulbright Scholarship in 1950 where she met her future husband, Peter Hoff. They moved to Marquette in 1968.

She worked as a physical therapist for Upper Peninsula Home Health and as a consultant for the Marquette County Health Department until 1998 when she was 78 years old. At the time of her retirement, she was older than most of her patients.

Lydia was preceded in death by her son, Carl in 1985 and her husband, Peter in 1994. She is survived by her daughter and son in law, Isabel and Wayne Francis of Marquette, her lifelong friend and extended family member, Matthew Edgell of Pittsburgh, and her three grandchildren: Thomas Edgell of Grand Junction, CO; Catherine Edgell of Portland, OR and Sarah Edgell of Marquette.


