

It is with great happiness that we introduce to you the winner of the 2019 Martha Griffiths Award: Cortney Salvucci Kingsley. Cortney was chosen from a field of truly impressive women who represent an exciting array of careers, interests and undergraduate work that was inspiring to us as we worked through the selection process.

Cortney is an Integrated Sciences major, with a minor in Spanish, who, upon graduation, plans to move to Rhode Island to teach sailing at Sail Newport. There, she will use her sailing certification and STEM Reach certifications to bring both science and sailing experiences to students. According to her nomination form, Cortney has been involved in the NMU Sailing Team as a Commodore, and she is also currently the chairwoman of the Midwest Collegiate Sailing Association's Special Interest Group. She started the first Women's Sailing Clinic two years ago where she brought together female sailors from

different colleges and high schools to engage in sailing clinics coached by elite level women sailors who currently sail for a career.

Cortney has also reconstructed the NMU sailing board with a proactive approach, empowering first-year female NMU students to take positions on the board with confidence. She has volunteered as a coach for children and adults with disabilities in both sailing and soccer during the last five years. Cortney also worked in after-school programs with students who live in a low-income housing area in Marquette, and she participated with elementary students in a two-way bilingual Spanish and English immersion program in Green Bay, Wisconsin. The Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) Is Up for Reauthorization

The Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) also referred to now as H.R. 1585 addresses four crimes: domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking. VAWA includes funds for free rape exams and training for law enforcement responding to incidents of sexual and domestic violence. H.R. 1585 provides modest but necessary updates to the present law. These needs were identified by providers on the ground working daily with survivors.

This bill, H.R. 1585, provides evidence-based prevention programs which will make communities safer. It holds predators preying on Native American women accountable. It offers protection for survivors in housing. VAWA supports victims who need assistance in rebuilding their lives. It improves the health care response to the four crimes.

This bill may come up in the U.S. House of Representatives this week. So please contact legislators immediately. We can hope for bipartisan support on this legislation

Equal Pay Day, April 2, 2019



To mark Equal Pay Day, The Marquette Branch of the American Association of University (AAUW) hosted an introduction to the free online Work Smart Workshop on salary negotiation. It was held in Whitman Commons on Northern Michigan University's campus.

Sadly, April 2, 2019 marks the day when on average women reach the pay men achieved by the end of the previous year for the same work. Although the pay gap has narrowed, the travesty continues. The U.S. Census Bureau revealed women working full time are typically paid 80 cents for the dollar paid to men. African American women make 61 cents and Latinas 53 cents compared to white men. At our present rate of progress women could close the gap in 2106, 87 years from now. When the 2017 salary numbers were adjusted for inflation, women's median earnings were unchanged, while men's salaries increased 0.9%.

Equal pay is not a Democrat or Republican issue or even a women's issue. The gender pay gap affects family income. Women having equal pay would cut in half the poverty rate for all working women. There are hopeful signs on the horizon. On March 27, 2019 the U.S. House of Representatives passed the Paycheck Fairness Act (PFA), H.R. 7 with **bipartisan** support by a vote of 242-187. Our U.S. Representative Jack Bergman voted Nay. Now the measure will go to the Senate.

The Paycheck Fairness Act (PFA) requires employers to prove pay disparities are a business necessity and job related. It bans salary history use which negatively impacts women. PFA protects workers from retaliation or penalization for discussing salaries. It helps employers implement fair pay practices. Call Senator Debbie Stabenow at 202 224 4822 or 906 228 8756 and Senator Gary Peters at 202 224 6221 or 906 226 4554 and ask them to support the Paycheck Fairness Act and push for its swift passage.

Representative Rosa DeLauro (D-Conn) and Senator Patty Murray (D –Wash) have introduced this bill in every Congress since 1997. The bill closes loopholes in the Equal Pay Act of 1963. Women and their families have been waiting too long for equal wages.

Research shows men are four times more likely than women to negotiate for salary and benefits. To close the gender gap AAUW is offering a <u>free online course</u> to train people in negotiation.

AAUW has set a goal of
