Meredith Kulisheck

The AAUW–Marquette Branch has a tradition of honoring branch individuals who enthusiastically exceed expectations to advance equity for women and girls. Each year, our branch gives a philanthropic gift of \$500 to AAUW–National in the name of a member who has worked tirelessly for AAUW and our branch. This year's contribution is being made to the *Selected Professions Grants*.

This year's Named Grant Honoree has given extraordinary time and energy to AAUW and our Branch. Drum roll.... We are delighted to designate Meredith Kulisheck as our Named Grant Honoree. Meredith moved to Marquette with her family 50 years ago. Her contributions to the broader Marquette community include decades of involvement with League of Women Voters. She was for a time First Lady of Marquette.

In the ten years our Named Grant Honoree has been a member of the AAUW–Marquette Branch, she has served on the Holiday dinner planning committee, Local Scholarship Committee, and Math and Science Committee, which is now the STEM Committee. Meredith fulfilled the responsibilities of Financial Vice President of our branch for five years with fidelity and good cheer. She willingly extended her term when asked. Her sense of responsibility and dedication to our Branch are discernible in her thorough execution of her obligations, always with a smile.

Meredith has had a long and highly successful career in education. She earned degrees in mathematics from Mankato State University and the University of Iowa. She is an Emeritus Associate Professor from Northern Michigan University where she taught in Mathematics and Computer Science. Meredith is well-rounded, well-travelled, well-read, curious, fun, and an exquisite knitter. AAUW Selected Professions Fellowships was established in 1970 with a \$25,000 grant from the Max C. Fleischmann Foundation to open doors for women in male-dominated fields of law and medicine. The fellowship has expanded to include science and technology because the demand for a technologically skilled work force grew without proportional representation of women.

The following prominent women have been recipients of the AAUW fellowships we help fund each year with our donation in the name of our local honoree:

- Judith Resnick who used her scholarship to complete a dissertation on Chemical Engineering and went on to become a Challenger astronaut.

Public Policy News - Michigan

The Good News

Michigan's poor residents who receive food and cash assistance now have a less restrictive threshold in

assets they possess to remain eligible. The income threshold level for many years was 130% of the federal poverty level for food assistance, 50% for cash assistance and 150% for emergency relief. Governor Rick Snyder eliminated those with more than \$5,000 in assets from receiving food assistance. The value of a second vehicle counted toward that limit. An asset of \$3000.00 was the limit for cash assistance.

Starting November Governor Whitmer changed the asset threshold to \$15,000.00 for all three programs. The second vehicle does not count toward the total asset. The Governor stated limited access to affordable nutrition is holding many families back from escaping generational poverty. More families will be able to put food on the table.

The former asset tests punished families who tried to save money. If their saving exceeded the asset, they had to spend down to be eligible. The Michigan League for Public Policy applauded the announced changes. Michigan's asset test significantly undercut actual assistance in state's cash, food and heating assistance programs making it harder to utilize benefits and punished families for sound financial management and savings building.

With this change in public policy, families are given a hand to lift themselves out of poverty and fewer children will go to school hungry.

Cheers for East Lansing's School Board

As of October 1, Michigan state law requires all school districts to adopt a policy to discipline staff for referring or assisting a student to obtain an abortion. On September 30, the East Lansing Board of Education unanimously rejected the motion to create such a policy. Instead they passed a resolution opposing this state law and called for the Attorney General Dana Nessel to challenge the constitutionality of Section 166 of this law which holds school districts hostage, restricting freedom of speech of school employees and board members regarding a legal medical procedure.

Apply for a seat on the 13 member Michigan commission responsible for redrawing the state's voting districts

All Michigan residents who are registered voters are eligible unless in the past 6 years they were a partisan candidate, elected official in local state or federal government, an officer in a political party, a consultant or employee of a political candidate, a legislative staffer, a registered lobbyist or an employee of one, an unclassified state employee

except those who work for public universities, the courts or the armed forces. The parent, child, spouse, stepparent of any of the aforementioned people.

You can fill out an application online. Go to: RedistrictingMichigan.org, download and print out the applications, complete it and get it notarized. Then submit it to the Secretary of State's office in person or by mail. Actually, the Secretary of State's offices will provide free notarization of commission applications. Applications will remain open until June 1, 2020. You have been wanting to make a real difference. This is your chance.

The national AAUW is working to make new membership more affordable and provide incentives to join when attending our meetings.

Kristen is passionate about creating inclusive and equitable learning for all children, families, and communities across various spaces.
