Our lives and AAUW schedules have been upended during the COVID-19 pandemic, so the AAUW board wants to share some helpful personal information aligned with the AAUW mission. Enjoy six practical ideas to advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy during Michigan's stay-in-place extension.

- 1. Learn a new skill. A new skill probably might not change your life during quarantine or impress friends, but challenging, meaningful mastery could help our attitudes. For example, I learned how to eat with chopsticks with my non-dominant hand. Chopsticks have become my preferred eating utensils. Hone skills for puzzles, charades via FaceTime or Zoom, ballroom dance steps, doodling, and cooking. The brain accommodates new kinesthetic knowledge relatively quickly.
- 2. Laugh often, love much. My sister learned five minutes before leaving for work last week that one of her nursing colleagues tested positive for COVID-19. I rearranged my 93-year-old mother's house so that my sister could isolate herself in the downstairs apartment when she returned from work. My mother gave up a private bedroom-bathroom suite to sleep in the living room and use a shared common bathroom, where she accidently dropkicked several rolls of toilet paper. She has a good kick. I asked her if she wanted to practice with the Nebraska Cornhuskers Punt Team. We laughed.
- **3. Frame issues as problems to be solved**. Work on concerns over which you have some control or

influence. Write letters to newspaper editors and members of Congress. Share your ideas with others. Celebrate steps toward success and all learning associated with progress, even learning associated with failures.

- **4. Practice helpful learning behaviors** (e.g., roll your shoulders while reading).
 - Eat healthy foods
 - Breathe deeply
 - Drink more water
 - Exercise
 - Get more sleep
- **5. Renew your AAUW membership.** We are fortunate to have our AAUW of Marquette community. We mentor each other and others, we care deeply, and we work hard for the good of women and girls and their families.
- **6. Give to the AAUW Scholarship Campaign.** Now, more than ever, women will need our support to complete their college educations. Thank you.

2020 Martha Griffiths Award

The Marquette Branch of the American Association of University Women announces the winner of the annual Martha Griffiths Award given to a highachieving graduating female senior at NMU with high involvement in her





discipline. The award is named in honor of one of Michigan's most influential women legislators in the last half of the 20th century. Martha Griffiths was known for her efforts in the Civil Rights Act and for getting the Equal Rights Amendment to the House floor for a vote in 1970.

This year's Martha Griffiths Award nominees were particularly competitive. The Awards Committee received 16 nominees, all of whom typified the leadership and drive of Martha Griffiths.

The 2020 Martha Griffiths Award goes to Crissa Karavas who is a Hospitality and Tourism Management major with an Entrepreneurship minor. Crissa graduates in May 2020 in two areas traditionally dominated by men. Although more than 50% of culinary school graduates are women, less than 7% of executive chef positions are held by women at leading culinary organizations and only 19% of chefs and head cooks are women. Female entrepreneurs have doubled in the last 20 years; however, only 40% of US businesses currently are owned by women.



Crissa worked 40+ hours a week as a kitchen manager at one of the popular restaurants in Marquette while she attended Northern as a full-time student and graduated with high

honors. She is student president of the NMU Hospitality Club, which contributed to the Salvation Army's Toys for Tots efforts during the holidays. She spearheaded the reestablishment of Memorial Chili Challenge, and she was instrumental in launching NMU's first hospitality-specific job fair.

Three NMU instructors submitted independent nominations for Crissa Karavas to receive the Martha Griffiths Award. Assistant Professor Loganne

Glendening of Hospitality and Tourism Management wrote, "Ms. Karavas is also a fulltime kitchen manager, gaining additional knowledge and experience to prepare her for a successful future. Ms. Karavas will play a role in changing the stigma associated with leadership in the hospitality industry."

Crissa plans to open her own culinary business in the future. College of Business instructor
Corinne Bodeman wrote that Crissa excelled in her Small Business Enterprise class and led a team of students to write a full 50-page business plan for a startup business. Her contributions to the team elevated the level of work to "near perfection". "I have never seen such tremendous work—both in thoroughness and ethic—from a student. Her level of dedication was constant through all levels of classwork, culminating with this final 400-level class. Though her dreams and aspirations are in the food and hospitality industry, there is no doubt Crissa would excel in any endeavor she should put her efforts into."

Crissa's abundant energy and entrepreneurial organization skills will help her achieve success in a highly relevant and challenging post-COVID-19 field. Associate Professor Deborah Pearce of Hospitality and Tourism Management wrote, "Ms. Karavas is a driven young woman. Her goals are clear and achievable. She has her fingers in many pies (note baking reference©) but manages to take care of schoolwork, work a full-time job, and have an active social life as well. She is always willing to help her fellow students with projects and assignments. I have observed that she stands as an inspiration to the younger students in our program."

AAUW of Marquette honors Crissa for her demonstrated promise and achievements to advance equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, and entrepreneurial work with a Martha Griffiths Award certificate, letter of congratulations, and a check for \$500.

Public Policy News

Meshugass

Meshugass, a Yiddish word, pronounced mish-ehgoss with the accent on goss, is defined in the Joys of Yiddish as "wacky, irrational nonsense, a state of affairs so unreal or silly that it defies explanation." We now have a classic example. The President of the United States advised people to inject or ingest Lysol to prevent getting COVUD-19.

Recently I inadvertently added to the world's *meshugass*. Fair and Equal Michigan is valiantly trying to collect signature to add LGBTQ rights to Michigan's Civil Rights Law. They collected 150.000 signatures and need 190,000 more to send this citizens-initiated bill to the legislature. COVID-19 restrictions intervened. We could not sign this petition at our meeting because we had to cancel our in-person meeting and instead just meet electronically. I had an email sent to our members asking that they contact me to request a petition, but that bore no fruit.

Then Fair and Equal Michigan tried to take the petition to an online signing. Four of our members who attempted to use this method met with requests for money. They could not close out of the process and were reluctant to give their driver's license number as requested. Fortunately, the group heard our complaints and removed the requirement for a driver's license from their website. However, the electronic signatures may not be recognized by the legislature anyway.

LGBTQ individuals *should* be protected from discrimination in housing, employment, public accommodation, public service and education. Why can't the Michigan legislature amend the Elliott Larsen Civil Rights Act as suggested by this petition? It is the right thing to do for Michigan.

The Equal Rights Amendment

The Equal Rights Amendment moved a little closer to ratification. On February 13, 2020, the U.S. House of Representatives voted 232-183 to remove the deadline for ratification. It was a bipartisan vote. Now it moves to the Senate. Contact our Senators to co-sponsor and vote for S.R. 6 to remove the deadline for ratification. This would allow Nevada,

Illinois and Virginia to count toward ratification. I warn you though, Senator Mitch Mc Connell is opposed to ERA. The only way forward may be to flip the Senate majority. Here's to seeing ERA passed in our lifetime! Call U.S. Senator Gary Peters, 202-224-622; and U.S. Senator Debbie Stabenow, 202-224-4822.

Michigan Reconnect Grants

Both House and Senate passed SB268 which is now PA 84 of 2020. The governor signed it. The grants offer financial assistance and scholarships to individuals age 25 or over who seek associate degrees or recognized industry certificate or credentials. It establishes the Reconnect Private Training Learning Initiative which provides skill scholarships for qualified occupational training programs. They hope 25,000 students will be approved the first year.

Right to Read Lawsuit

The U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled that there is a fundamental right to education in the United States and several Detroit students presented sufficient arguments to bring their case forward alleging the State of Michigan deprived them of that right. The lawsuit was originally filed against Governor Rick Snyder, Governor Gretchen Whitmer as his successor becomes the lead defendant. The children allege that they have been relegated to a school system that does not give even a plausible chance to attain literacy. These plaintiffs still must prove their contentions at trial, but this ruling opens the court room door.

Redistricting Commission Can Continue

Republicans tried to overturn a U.S. District Court of Appeals ruling that these plaintiffs failed to provide legal grounds for blocking the commission's implementation. Now the 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals Judge Karen Moore found that conditions placed on selecting commissioner were constitutional and did not violate their (Republican's) rights. In 2018 Michigan voters overwhelmingly voted to take politicians out of redistricting establishing a citizen led fair impartial and transparent redistricting process. Over 4000 applications have been processed. The Republican legislature tried to limit funding for this commission, but the Secretary of State has vowed her office will fund the commission's work.

Grateful for all the friendship, support, mentoring and education AAUW provides, Karlyn has served as chair of the branch, co- chair of the program committee, member of its executive committee, and has been its public policy representative forever.

Currently, Karlyn is part of Michigan AAUW's Virtual Lobby Corps and the branch's book group is one of her greatest pleasures.

Karlyn is a retired Speech and Language Pathologist who specialized in treating patients who survived stroke and traumatic injury. In connection with that, she brought to the attention of AAUW the plight of women who had become her patients as a result of the beatings they received from their spouses.

These individuals had nowhere to go. So, at Karlyn's urging, the Marquette Branch sought and received a grant from National AAUW to publish a resource directory for spousal abuse survivors. In performing this task, Karlyn and branch members drew together a community-wide task force. The work of this task force resulted in a unified community response to domestic violence as well as a shelter.

Since then, Karlyn is referred to as a founding mother of the Women's Center and Harbor House. Her lifelong passion is access to care and community service. She served as a Marquette County Commissioner for 6 years and presently is on the Marquette County Board of Health.

Karlyn takes great pride in the accomplishments of her 3 children, 4 grandchildren and 4 great grandchildren. She loves to travel and work out. She says the best decisions she made in her life were marrying Jim Rapport and joining AAUW. And as her photograph above shows, the present love of her life is Jack Benny her 2-year old Cairn Terrier.



A Brief Introduction to AAUW and MARQUETTE BRANCH

Since its first meeting in 1881, the American Association of University Women has been a catalyst for change. Today, AAUW, with 160,000 college and university graduates as members and more than 1,600 branches nationwide, the AAUW Educational Foundation and the AAUW Legal Advocacy Fund continue to take the lead in transforming the world for all women and girls. We share the common goals of AAUW: to promote education and self-development over the life span and to foster equity and positive societal change.

This year members of the Marquette Branch are celebrating our 70th anniversary. We have been supporting the larger AAUW organization and the Marquette community through various efforts:

- * In 1950, to raise money for the International Fellowship fund, Branch members staged the first of many plays for Marquette's children to enjoy.
- * In 1956 the Branch initiated Halloween collections for UNICEF in Marquette.
- * In 1959 we organized the first of our "USED BOOK SALES" to generate monies for AAUW'S Scholarship programs.
- * In 1961 Branch members began the puppet shows that are performed each year in area's schools.
- * In addition to raising money to support scholarships at the national level, our Branch as for 20 years raised enough to establish a local scholarship. Our current scholarship is for an NMU student in the amount of \$800.00
- * We are in our fifth year of supporting the Women's Book Project which places books about women and women's history in the Marquette school libraries.
- * And we look forward to the Math, Science and Technology Conference for Girls which we co-sponsor at NMU in the Spring.

We are observing 47 years of partnership with Northern Michigan University. Since 1953 NMU has continued as a corporate member of our Branch and we are extremely proud of the relationship we enjoy with the university.

In 1966 the Marquette Branch joined the Federation of Women's Clubs and our members support the projects that support this Historic Home.

We will continue to work toward realizing the goals of the American Association of University Women on a global, national and most importantly, local level.
