Voting Matters!

The August primary in Michigan is a cautionary tale; 6,405 ballots arrived late and were not counted. Now as ruled by Judge Cynthia Stephens, ballots postmarked the day before Election Day must be counted even if they arrive after the polls close. This ruling will most likely be appealed. If you mail your ballot mail it by October 20 and put two first class stamps on the envelope. Be sure to sign the outside envelope. There was no signature on 1,438 ballots in August and these votes were not counted. Thirtyone people mailed the envelopes and forgot to include the ballot. Every vote matters.

This is such an important election. Be sure **your** vote is counted. The Secretary of State is urging voters

who vote absentee: to drop off your ballot at your city or township clerk's office or place it in the ballot drop box. You can track your absentee ballot by going to www.michigan.gov/vote.

The League of Women Voters of Marquette County will be holding a candidate forum for Marquette City Commission Candidates and one for candidates for Sheriff. They will be taped. Access to these tapes have not yet been announced.

The Michigan House and Senate approved absentee ballot pre-processing the day before the election in communities of 25,000 or more. This will allow ballots to be counted on Election Day more efficiently. This measure affects only this year's election. Calls to legislators helped this pass with bi-partisan support.

Ruth Bader Ginsburg's Dying Wish

Ruth Bader Ginsburg dictated: "My most fervent wish is that I will not be replaced until a new president is installed." In saying this Ruth Bader Ginsburg wanted the choice of her successor to reflect the will of we the people going forward. The public, 67% of us, agree that this close to an election

the Supreme Court nomination should be done by the next sitting president. Despite RBG's many years of extraordinary public service, her dying wish is to be denied by the U.S. Senate.

What price are we the people paying for this denial? RBG's legacy. What is hanging in the balance? Repeal of the Affordable Care Act. The Affordable Care Act now covers 23 million Americans who will lose health care coverage at this time of the COVID - 19 pandemic if ACA is repealed.

On a woman's right to choose, Ruth Bader Ginsburg said" It is essential to a woman's equality with man that she be the decision maker, that her choice be controlling. If you impose restraints that impede her choice you are disadvantaging her because of her sex." There are 17 cases to come before the Supreme Court which will impact reproductive freedom, access to contraception and health care.

The Equal Rights Amendment was ratified by the 38th state, Virginia. Currently the federal archivist has been barred from filing the Virginia ratification. Ruth Bader Ginsburg felt ERA was the bedrock of constitutional law needed to assure equal rights for women. Challenges to ERA will surely be before the Supreme Court.

The appointment of RBG's replacement will affect the outcome of cases before the Supreme Court especially women's rights, health care and immigration. We have lost a brilliant woman who worked tirelessly for justice for we, the people.

What can be done? VOTE. If you vote in person November 3. Tell them Ruth sent you.

June Davis served as the AAUW-Marquette Corresponding Secretary for years. She chaired numerous holiday dinners, worked tirelessly on Hospitality Committees, and consistently assisted with the AAUW's Book Sale.

Taylor Susa was co-chair of the Membership Committee, founding member of the AAUW-NMU student group, and AAUW-NMU liaison to the AAUW-Marquette board. She currently is pursuing a dual PhD at Indiana University-Bloomington in the Neuroscience and Vision Science programs.
