Public Policy Priorities

If you are quick...

...you can comment on AAUW's Public Policy Priorities for 2021-2023 by going to [aauw.org](#) and fishing around the membership bylaws tool kit for the public policy priorities. **Do so by February 5.** I am pleased with the proposed changes which address structural and systemic racism and the need for accurate collection of high quality data. These changes can help us better direct policy decisions. I asked for the inclusion of a stronger statement guiding how AAUW will deal with conspiracy theorists, hate and sedition. In the broader sense, these issues are covered by the proposed public policy priority changes.

Michigan House Representative Donna Lasinski met with Michigan AAUW's virtual lobby corps She tried to pass a measure requiring legislators to renounce conspiracy theory views prior to their being sworn in,

but she was not successful in this. Representative Lasinski spoke candidly about safety issues at the Capitol. We are one of a few states nationwide that does not have metal detectors at entrances to the Capitol. Concealed carry weapons remain a threat.

The Global Gag Rule

In the midst of a zillion crises, on January 28, President Joe Biden rescinded the Mexico City Policy, AKA the Global Gag Rule on abortion. In 2019 Trump expanded the ban to cover all U.S. health aid, meaning no U.S. funding could go to any organization which made abortion referrals or discussed abortion as an option. Because reproductive health and sexual health services are integrated in health clinics, HIV programs, maternal health, water and sanitation programs, this draconian ban caused health clinics to close and vital programs to be cancelled.

The International Planned Parenthood Federation lost \$110 million. This money could have prevented 4.8 million unintended pregnancies. Marie Stopes International (MSI) Reproductive Choices* lost \$30 million. They say the money could have prevented 1.8 million unsafe abortions and 20,000 maternal deaths.

Biden's action is an important one in favor of women's health.

Pass the Paycheck Fairness Act

You have heard this before. The Paycheck Fairness Act closes loopholes which allow employers to justify unfair pay. It creates remedies for discriminated employees. It prevents employers from retaliating against workers who discuss salary. It prohibits use of a salary history to determine wages. It provides training and assistance, data collection and funds for research. We are still earning 82 cents on the dollar men earn if we are "lucky." Please call our legislators and ask them to pass the Paycheck Fairness Act. Maybe this time.....

AAUW Introduces Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Toolkit

AAUW National recently launched its [Diversity, Equity & Inclusion Toolkit](#) to help branches expand our efforts toward our achieving equity. The toolkit features definitions of key

terms and concepts, such as diversity, inclusion, intersectionality, and allyship. It also gives specific tips for having difficult conversations along the journal to cultural competence and for planning the branch's diversity efforts.

According to the national website, "The AAUW Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) resources aim to

identify best practices for promoting diversity, equity and inclusion within AAUW. These resources present guidelines for how AAUW branches, national members, student members and individual members can demonstrate an understanding of AAUW's mission, values, goals and strategic plan."

During a webinar in December, the AAUW leadership emphasized that this toolkit does not have a section on recruiting strategies to bring in a more diverse membership. Instead, they said that our organization, at all levels, needs to start by developing strategies that demonstrate a commitment to equity and create an inclusive space for current and future members. Membership initiatives can be successful after that.

The toolkit recommends several steps that branches can take to [maximize diversity and inclusion efforts](#):

1. Appoint a diversity officer
2. Create a diversity and inclusion committee
3. Create a diversity and inclusion plan to help our efforts be organized and connected to broader goals

As we start our planning, the toolkit also recommends an environmental scan, asking us to examine our recruitment, retention, and programming. By understanding where we are currently, we are in a better position to agree on realistic and achievable goals.

DR. ARNE VAINIO
THE IMPACT OF COVID-19 ON INDIAN COUNTRY

Arne Vainio, M.D. was born to a Finnish father and an Ojibwe mother as one of seven children. When he was four years old, his father committed suicide and poverty followed. He credits less than a double handful of people for changing his course and advises we are all that person for someone who might be lost. After working as a many different jobs, he began a career in medicine in 1985 as a professional firefighter/paramedic. He has been a family practice physician on the Fond du Lac reservation since 1997, and is currently serving as a member at large for the Association of American Indian Physicians Board of Directors. Arne has won multiple awards for his service including: Indian Health Service National Directors Award 2008-2009; National Diabetes Physicians Recognition Award 2010; and, Association of American Indian Physicians Physician of the Year 2017.
