2021 AAUW National Election Results

The AAUW national membership achieved a quorum of 5% of eligible voters within three days of voting in AAUW's 2021 National Election. Overall, 22.85% of eligible AAUW voters cast a ballot.

AAUW public policy priorities were approved by 92% of voters. Julia Brown was re-elected as AAUW-National board chair. Malinda Gaul was re-elected as vice chair. Joseph Bertolino and Michigan's Elizabeth Haynes retained their board seats. All elected positions are three-year terms.

The AAUW board-recommended ballot initiative to remove the college-degree membership requirement received 63% of the vote, which was less than the two-thirds majority required to enact a bylaws change.

Michigan AAUW voters were 64% in favor of open membership. Wisconsin AAUW voters were 74.5% in favor of open membership. The highest percentage of votes in favor of open membership occurred in Maine (93%), Puerto Rico (92%), and Alaska (91%). The lowest percentage of votes in favor of open membership occurred in Oklahoma (40.6%), New Hampshire (40.9%), and Florida (41.3%).

Since 64% of Michigan votes were cast in favor of open membership, more AAUW Michiganders were disappointed by the outcome than were joyful; however, regardless of your voting position, we share a steadfast commitment to AAUW's mission to advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education and advocacy, and we share AAUW's vision to achieve equity for all. Hold fast to our shared AAUW commitments as we continue striving together toward diversity, equity, and inclusion.

The Senate Confirmed Kristen Clarke to head the Justice Department's Civil Rights Division

AAUW joined 55 organizations—for gender justice, reproductive health rights, justice and anti-violence-in sending a strong letter to the Senate Committee on the Judiciary in support of Kristen Clarke's confirmation. Kristen Clarke is the first woman and the first black woman to head this division.

Clarke will oversee several Sections in the Division: the Employment Section which litigates discrimination cases under Title VII; the Educational Opportunities Section which sees Title IX claims; and the Criminal Section which handles cases under Freedom of Access to Clinic Entrances and prosecutes hate crimes. Disability rights, gender justice, voting rights, immigration and housing cases are also covered by this Division.

Kristen Clarke brings 20 years of experience advancing equal justice in state, federal and national civil rights organization. She most recently was Director of the respected Lawyers Committee for Civil Rights under Law. This group was on the forefront of combating the alarming rise in hate crimes, white supremacy, and voter suppression. They held law officers accountable for violating the rights of peaceful Black Lives Matters protesters. She defended racial diversity policies in higher education and fought attempts to eviscerate policies which prevented housing discrimination.

After these past four years, the Department of Justice is in dire need of strong leadership to rebuild trust in the agency's ability to protect the rights of all people in America. We need to return to the rule of law and rectify the systemic harm and trauma the Department has inflicted on people of color. It is a tall order but Kristen Clarke's proven civil rights leadership, her experience and expertise will serve our country well.

Every Republican on the Judiciary Committee opposed Clarke's nomination. When the vote was brought to the floor of the Senate, one lone Republican, Susan Collins, supported her confirmation. Clarke was confirmed by a vote of 51-48. John Kennedy (R LA) did not vote.

Boo!

In Michigan, a Republican sponsored bill expanding Michigan's third grade read or flunk law to fourth

graders next year was approved by the Senate Education committee.

It is likely Governor Gretchen Whitmer will oppose this legislation. In 2022-2023 the law would revert and apply only to third graders. State Superintendent Michael Rice opposed this legislation. He said: "Local school districts need to work with families to focus on reading supports and minimize retentions and the adverse impact on children." A spokesperson for Whitmer stated," Instead of holding students back, we advocate for boosting third grade reading scores by increasing access to high quality pre-school, hiring and retaining excellent educators and literacy coaches...." It should be noted that the bill did not contain any money for carrying out these measures.

Yea!

The Governor and the Legislature agreed on a budget.

This Month in AAUW History-1961


Usually, May was a time when AAUW slowed down for the year to take a well-deserved summer vacation. After the annual used book sale wrapped up in late April, members took a break and did not resume holding events until the new school year picked up in September. Fortunately, the archives' database had one old photographic negative from May with a nice story to tell.



Seventy years ago, in May of 1961, the AAUW Marquette branch and *First Lady Elizabeth Harden* hosted a reception that honored women graduates. Although the photograph from the event is grainy and overexposed, it shows some of the students and women being celebrated at the Harden home at 537 W. Kaye. Reporting from the Mining Journal states that three area high school students who received superior marks in Northern's recent forensics festival performed their pieces; also speaking was past-AAUW Michigan president, Mrs. C.M. Humphrey Jr. of Ironwood.

Edgar Harden had become president of Northern Michigan College in 1956, and from the start he worked with his wife, Elizabeth, to expand Northern's relationship with the greater Upper Peninsula. This reception was one of those countless attempts to strengthen bonds between students, graduates, and community leaders of Marquette.
