Please Do More than Hope!

There are so many opportunities for advocacy and so little time.

The U.S. Senate Judiciary Committee held hearings on ERA on Feb 28. **You can watch** on YouTube on the ERA Coalition's Facebook page. This was the *first hearing on ERA since 1984.* This one is entitled The Equal Rights Amendment: How Congress Can Recognize Ratification of ERA and Enshrine Equality in our Constitution.

SJ Res 4 is a bipartisan resolution introduced by Ben Cardin (D) MD and Lisa Murkowski (R) Alaska. It declares ERA has been fully ratified. Constitutional scholars will argue at this hearing that Congress can assert the ratification of ERA and the filibuster should not apply. Call Senator Debbie Stabenow and Senator Gary Peters. Tell them to do whatever is needed to support passage of ERA now. It is unconscionable that the timeline on ERA has not been removed. ERA needs to be published as part of our Constitution. Seventy percent of Americans think we have sex equality in our Constitution, we don't. We have waited 100 years for equal rights. Recent efforts to roll back the few rights we have should indicate why ERA is needed now.

On the state level, the Michigan Senate Health Policy committee is considering SB 2 and SB37 which would repeal the 1931 ban on abortion. After the tragic mass shooting at Michigan State University, the Michigan legislature introduced 16 bills which if enacted would have significant impact on reducing deaths by gun violence. Bills dealing with universal background checks, safe firearm storage laws and "red flag" or extreme risk orders—which allows confiscation of firearms temporarily, if a judge, through court order, rules the individual is considered a harm to themselves or others--are more likely to be passed. These bills are SB76-SB 86. They have been referred to Senate Civil Rights, Senate Judiciary and Public Safety Committees. A call to State Senator Ed McBroom would help these along.

Secretary of State, Jocelyn Benson is eager to ban firearms at polling places. HB 4127-HB 4128 HB4129 HB4130 make intimidation, harassment of election workers a felony and, prohibit firearms from polling places. Voters Not Politicians are pushing HB 4127 and HB 4128.

SB 4 ELCRA and HB 4003 ELCRA protect sexual orientation and gender identity under the Elliott Larson Civil Rights Act. These bills went to the Civil Rights, Judiciary and Public Safety Committees.

In other news we could lose access to mifepristone nationally if banned by a federal judge in Texas. This is medication used to terminate a pregnancy. It was approved by FDA 20 years ago and is used in half of abortions in the U.S. The medication misoprostol is an alternative.

Pick the issue that moves you most.

Instead of hoping for the best, **do** your best. Call the legislators and request their support. Together we can get them to move on meaningful legislation.
