Partnering with the League of Women Voters of Marquette County

Following discussion at the final general membership meeting in May 2023, those in attendance decided to pursue community partnership and budgeted a small amount to do so. A partnership activity with Voters Not Politicians for a Democracy Academy took place in September 2023 at no cost to AAUW-MQT. Several AAUW members and the community at large attended.

At the most recent board meeting, March 21, 2024, a partnership with LWV of Marquette County was approved for a candidate forum for the 109th House District for Michigan since both AAUW and LWV are non-partisan and support informing the voting public about the candidates and issues. Both groups' policies are to neither approve nor disapprove of candidates or political parties.

Forums are very expensive to run and AAUW has in the past supported LWV candidate forums. We will

again make a donation (amount to be determined within budgeted amount) in support of the June 28, 2024 forum preceding the Primary election with a location to be determined.

AAUW members are invited to help at the forum. We will also be able to have a table with our literature at this event. Volunteers for the table at this event are welcome. We will also announce book sale at the April 3 LWV general membership meeting and request that books be donated to our sale. Thank you, Marge, for doing this.

As a reminder, there are now many ways to vote in Michigan. You can apply for **permanent** no reason absent voter status, you can apply for only those elections you wish to vote absentee. You can vote in person through 9 days of early in-person voting for State and Federal Elections, or on Election Day in person.

Returning your absent voter ballot couldn't be easier. Postage is pre-paid, so you can drop it in the mail up to **2 weeks before** Election Day. Or you may return your ballot in person to your local clerk on or before Election Day. You may tabulate your absent voter (AV) ballot during the 9 days of early in person voting or on Election Day. It is up to you.

Managing receipts from Tadych's Marketplace By Meredith Kulisheck

The job of managing the receipts from Tadych's Marketplace (formerly Econo Foods) is one that *can largely be done at your convenience.*

A reminder to the members needs to be in the newsletter. Members can be asked to bring the receipts to meetings or to mail or deliver them to your home. (I recommend all of these options be encouraged.)

With each receipt, begin with the pre-tax total. Subtract charges for alcohol, tobacco, lottery tickets and gift cards. Write the result on the receipt. Receipts must be dated on December 6, 2021, and must be turned in within 2 years of purchase date.

Put the receipts in batches of about 25-30. Run an itemized total of the receipts in each batch and staple it to the batch.

Run an itemized total of all the batches to find the total of all receipts being turned in. Checks must be for at least \$50.00 (\$5,000 total for all receipts turned in.)

Checks are processed twice a year. Check with the store to learn the dates when you must turn in receipts and when the checks will be available.

The following information must be included with the receipts you are turning in: your contact information (name and phone number) as well as the organization ('American Association of University Women' and 'AAUW'), the total value of the receipts, and our tax ID number. Someone must go to the store to get the check. The name of any people authorized to receive the check must be given.

I was asked to give an estimate of how much time this takes. I've never kept track of my time, partly because I have never done an entire batch at one time. The amount of time required also depended on the number of receipts that were turned in to me.

Public Policy News

Michigan Family Protection Act

Nine House bills, 5207 through 5215, support parents, children and surrogates. These bills legalize and regulate surrogacy. The bill package includes requirements for age, health care and financial compensation. Existing law penalized contractual surrogacy. Parents having children through surrogacy are required to seek court orders to show that they are parents of a child biologically theirs, but the mother did not give birth to the child. The bills include best practices to assure surrogates are fairly compensated, have legal representation, are scrutinized by medical professional before entering a contractual agreement. It assures children born by surrogacy are treated equally under the law. These bills make it easier and cheaper to have parental relationships recognized.

Other states make it harder to start a family. In Michigan opportunities are expanding for reproductive health care. In addition, this legislature is addressing the cost of raising a child by making free pre-kindergarten, free breakfast and lunch available. *What better investment can we make? Well, women could be better compensated.*

A new report by the Michigan Women's Commission showed Michigan women now make 81 cents on the dollar men earn. The gap widens if you factor in race, ethnicity, and education. Black women make 68 cents on the dollar compared to white men. Hispanic women earn 67 cents on the dollar compared to white male workers. More educated women came 4.5 cents closer to white males.

A proposed Caregiver Tax credit in the 2025 budget is an effort to address the \$300,000 shortfall a women loses over a lifetime as a consequence of caregiving. Earned Income Tax Credit was expanded last year to ease the burden on working women and their families. ERA and The Paycheck Fairness Act would solve this inequity. We can't achieve this unless women vote for candidates who will see these measures enacted into law.
